Pwlldu Bay West Caves consist of three small caves, none with accessible passages more than a few metres long. According to Davies (1993), his numbered cave 97, (**Pwlldu Bay Cave**) in the west end of the bay could have some archaeological deposits, as could fissure **Cave 96**² and the slightly larger **Cave 94**. **Caves 93** and **94** are high in the west cliffs of Pwlldu Head. No caves have been recorded in the large area of the old quarry face.

At the top of the steep wooded cliffs, follow the Wales Coast Path towards Hunts Bay. A path on the headland leads down to **Graves End**, a memorial, and the burial site for 68 men press-ganged into the Royal Navy in 1760. They were being transported from Swansea to Falmouth, but all drowned while chained and locked in the hold of the brig *Cesare* when it was wrecked on the point.

Ogof y Cregyn is a small south-facing cave tucked under a ridge in the cliff face, high on Pwlldu Head and only visible from the sea.

The footpath to Three Cliffs Bay is along the cliff top. This section of cliff contains many of Gower's most famous caves. Some, such as Bacon Hole contain quantities of interglacial
